



## From the Priest's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The season of Lent has begun. In other Latin-based languages, the word they use for Lent is a derivative of the number forty. Our word 'Lent' comes from an Old English word that means 'spring'. It is a new springtime in our lives. We once again immerse ourselves in the saving message of the Gospel – Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection.

For the first five Sundays of Lent, I will be preaching a series of homilies. Normally, homilies do not connect to one another from Sunday to Sunday. The homily series will be exploring something called: "The Kerygma (κήρυγμα)" which is a fancy Greek term meaning "the announcement". In ancient times, a kήrix (κήρηξ) was a herald or a town-crier who would shout out the headlines of the day from the city-state government. The kerygma was the announcement itself. We will be exploring in the next five homilies: what is the announcement of the Gospel? How do we succinctly and effectively tell the story of Jesus Christ? Think of it as a beginner's catechism.

Lent is all about conversion and repentance in our life. In the early church it was the period of time when those who were being baptized underwent their final purification and scrutiny for baptism at the Easter Vigil. In the early middle ages, Lent took on another characteristic as a time of repentance for those already baptized persons who had been separated from Holy Communion by sin. They would confess their sins (out loud in front of everyone!) and receive their penance. Then on Holy Thursday morning the Bishop would lay hands on them and absolve them of their sins welcoming them back to the Eucharist. As we dive deeper into the 'kerygma' these next five Sundays, what in your life needs redemption?

**Saint of the Week-** Saint Margaret of Cortona—Feast Day February 22 1247-1297 This Italian penitent was the daughter of Tuscan peasants and, for nine years, the mistress of a young nobleman near Montepulciano. After her lover died violently, Margaret and her illegitimate child were given a home by the Franciscans in Cortona. She became a Franciscan tertiary and practiced severe self-denial. Until her son grew up, she earned their living and performed works of charity. In one vision, Christ told her she was "the third light" of the order, after Francis and Clare. Her prayers and counsel prompted many conversions, and she was considered a living saint.
