

HOLY AND INNOCENT CHILDREN OF GOD, Opening Prayer: May we partake in the goodness, especially the mercy of the Lord God now and forever.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word: Today Second Sunday of Easter or Divine Mercy Sunday, the response to the Psalm invites us to: "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting." The Psalm itself from Psalm 118 enumerates the goodness of God which express his everlasting love and mercy. The Lord helps those in difficulty, the Lord grants courage and strength, and the Lord has been our Savior. The First Reading is about the many signs and wonders accomplished through the Apostles which express the kindness or the mercy of God. Since many people came to believe in Jesus and many sick people were also cured, the number of believers increased. Not only were the Apostles able to draw the people to Jesus and to cure them but Jesus himself gave His Apostles the power to reconciled people to God and make them his children through the sacrament of confession. In today's Gospel reading Jesus makes himself visible to His Apostles and gives them the Holy Spirit and the authority to forgive sins.

We Obtain the Mercy of God the Father through Christ and the Holy Spirit: God the Father is revealed as 'a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness' (Exodus 34: 6). God revealed His mercy, first and foremost, in sending His only begotten Son to become our Savior: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (John 3: 16). The mercy of God become living and visible in Jesus of Nazareth, reaching its culmination in him: "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law" (Galatians 4: 4). Jesus Christ is the face of the Father's mercy because whoever sees Jesus sees the Father (See John 14: 9). The 'great mercy' (1 Peter 1: 3) of God has been demonstrated in a unique way in the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ suffered so that we might be saved from the fires of hell; he died so that we might not experience everlasting death; and he arose so that we might live with him forever in heaven. The mercy of Jesus Christ is so great that even in the midst of his excruciating suffering on the cross, he still asked the Father to forgive us. Even after His resurrection Jesus showed his Apostles his great mercy when he did not rebuke or ask for apology from his Apostles who had denied and deserted him at his crucial hour. Rather, His words to them which He repeated twice were: "Peace be with you" (See John 20: 19; 21), and He goes on to empowered them with the ministry of mercy: "..., Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20: 22-23).

We Obtain the Mercy of Jesus through the Forgiveness of our own Sins: Apart from the fact that the great mercy (1 Peter 1: 3) of God has been demonstrated in a unique way in the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Gospel reading today presents us with Jesus's institution of the Sacrament of reconciliation-a Sacrament of Divine Mercy. The Risen Lord gave the Apostles and their successors the power to forgive sins with the words, "..., Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20: 19-23). As the Jews themselves admitted: "Who but God alone can forgive sins" (Mark 2: 7), it is only Jesus who has this authority to bind and loose, to close and to open the door to heaven, and to reconciliation with God. Jesus gave His Apostles this very authority when He instituted the sacrament of Reconciliation. Consequently, the words of absolution which the priest utters are not just human words, but Divine words and promises which have the real power to forgive and communicate the forgiveness of God; since Jesus gave the authority to exercise that power to his Apostles and their successors.

Called to Be People of Faith and Called to Be Channels of Mercy Ourselves: The famous profession of faith by the Apostle-Thomas, "My Lord and my God," happened when the Lord Jesus made his presence known to Thomas and reassured him that he had indeed overcome death. When Thomas recognized Jesus, he believed and exclaimed that Jesus was truly Lord and truly God! Through the gift of faith we, too, are called to proclaim that Jesus is our personal Lord and our God, who died and rose so that we, too, may have new life in him. Besides our faith in Jesus as one who died and rose from the dead, we are also invited to have faith in the sacrament of reconciliation which Jesus himself instituted. In order to be eligible for the merciful judgment of God, we who have faith in Him and his sacrament of reconciliation and approach Him for the forgiveness of their faults are called upon to also grant that same forgiveness to those who offend them, as well as practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy in our daily lives. So, there is the need for faith in Jesus who is risen from the dead and faith in the sacrament of reconciliation instituted by Jesus. While we ask God for forgiveness, we need to forgive others ourselves and to practice of mercy towards others too.

Closing Prayer: May our faith in the resurrection of Jesus Christ and His goodness and mercy inspire and sustain us to be merciful to others now and always. ~ FR. JOHN WILLIAM
